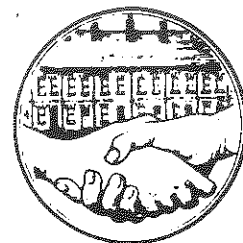

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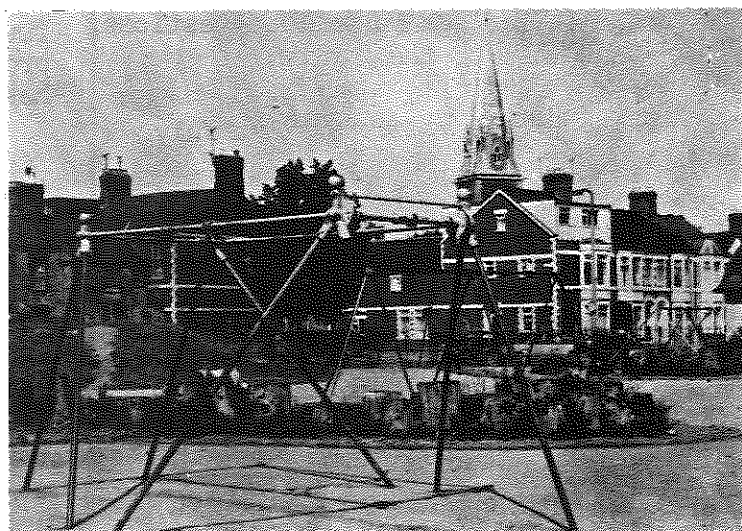

THE SOUTH RIVERSIDE YOUTH CLUB

The South Riverside Youth Club was started at the Community Centre last November on a shoestring and with the expectation of perhaps thirty or so members.

A month later there were a hundred members - all asking what they could do!

Table tennis equipment, snooker, darts and kitting out the football team exhausted our funds - Fitzalan youth wing kindly passed on a table tennis table and Mr. Butterworth gave us a magnificent cricket set.

A number of friendly football matches were played - culminating in a 6-5 win. Our membership of the Welsh Association of Youth Clubs enabled us to take part in their Round Wales Run (our part of Wales was Culverhouse Cross to Barry Island) in the Easter holidays, and a small but enthusiastic band of girls shamed the boys by walking ten miles for sponsorship funds - and were rewarded afterwards with a splendid tea provided by the Association.

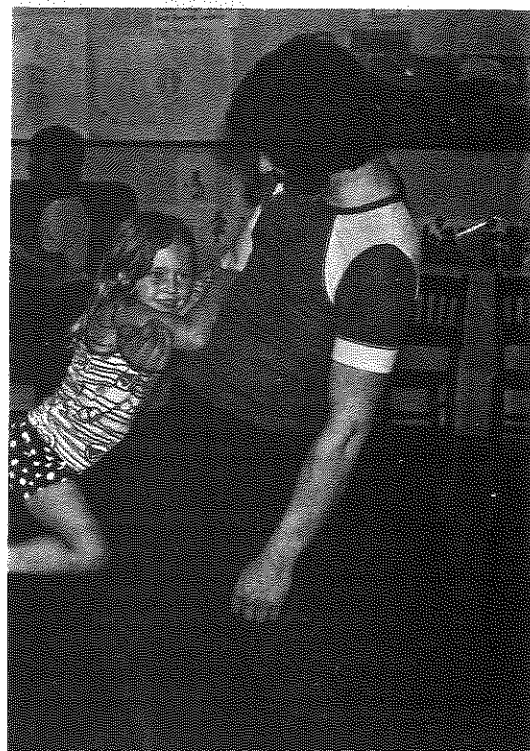
£6 was collected for Leprosy to help combat leprosy in under-developed countries, and a day's flag selling in Queen Street resulted in £32 shared between the Association and the club.

A jumble sale, an evening's entertainment by a folk group and a St. Valentine's disco dance were enjoyable successes, and so that small brothers and sisters weren't left out, Mr. John Robinson showed a programme of popular cartoons.

With the better weather, the club was able to spend the major part of its Friday meetings out of doors with cricket, baseball and swimming, to the relief of the organisers - and the neighbours!

Forty or so youngsters meeting on any one evening clearly presents problems in our not very large hall - we shall need to re-organise and re-think for September. Our under-16 football team will take part in the Cardiff and District League matches 1976/77 and we hope that sport outside the Centre will continue to play a large part in our activities - as will our most popular indoor happening, the snack bar.

Indoor activities are more difficult to arrange, and the club needs the support of parents and friends who will offer skills, help and equipment. Our members are a great bunch of youngsters, who have turned up through thick and thin - they need and deserve our commitment and interest.

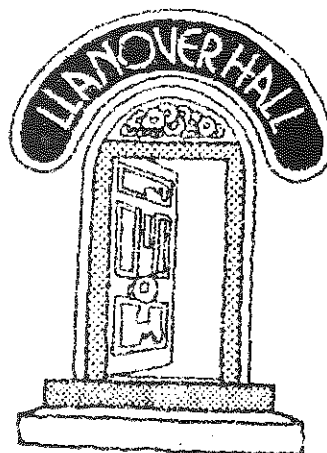

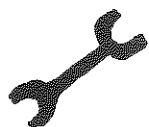

SCHOOL SPORTS DAY

The annual school's sports day at Kitchener Junior School is always an event looked forward to with great enthusiasm and optimism. Weeks before the set day, excitement mounts as preliminary heats are run off one by one and the best competitors are chosen to represent their house on the day. Everybody hopes that the day will prove to be a fine one and fingers are kept crossed by the captains of each house that their house will be victorious.

The children are divided into four different houses each with both a distinguishing name and colour: Andrew (blue), Patrick (green), George (yellow), and David (red).

Naturally, each child is very proud of his/her particular house and so we have the situation where, weeks before the event, playful rivalry between children of different houses occurs.

The day arrives with a number of dark clouds looking threatening like rain looming in the distance. Thankfully, these soon disappear giving way to a clear blue sky which seems to be ideal for the day. This is the weather we had been hoping for.

That morning final preparations are made for the event. Children's names are checked houses are listed, coloured bands are given out to each child and a final check is made to ensure that no child is left out of a race. Mr. Pedwell, the sports master, has the difficult task of organising the event and each year he always ensures that every child throughout the school is at least running in one race. If you're not the fastest sprinter in the world then at least the egg and spoon race may be more up your street.

The afternoon arrives, the sun still shining and one by one, the children are

called out to be placed in order ready to walk to the Recreation ground. This over, the long crocodile makes its way slowly across two main roads until the ground is in sight. Already, excitement is mounting as the first ten races are lined up ready for the opening. Anxious parents wait for their child's name to be called out and younger brothers and sisters shout support from the side of the track.

Mr. Edwards, the Headmaster, is seated in the place of honour near the finishing line complete with table, chair and loudspeaker ready to announce the winners and Mr. Evans, the Deputy Head, and 'starter' is all set for the first race, the 50 metre sprint in class 1. "Take your marks! Get set! Go!". Gradually, each race is run and judged with placings given for 1st, 2nd and 3rd.

The last race of all - the relay for Standard 3 and 4 boys is nearing its end and soon the total points for each house are added up to reveal that this year's winner is ANDREW HOUSE. The two proud captains, Robert Anderson and Elizabeth Johnson come forward to receive the school trophy and be congratulated by Mrs Morgan.

The equipment is collected and the field left clean and tidy and the children make their way back to school. Another Sports Day is over for another year.

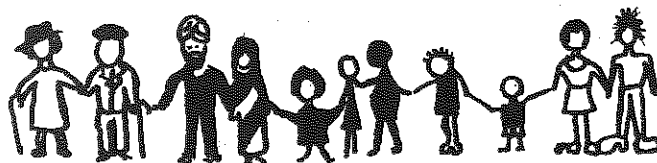

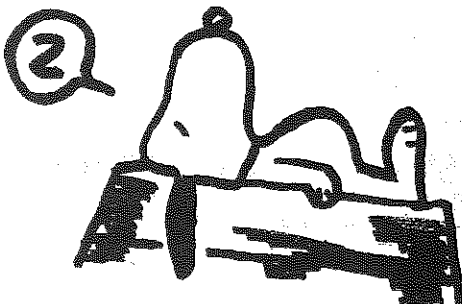
